Dear Friends,


In Pathhead Church's magazine, I noted the fact that the Season of Advent is like a journey to the Manger, providing an opportunity for spiritual reflection along the way. Like most long journeys there are ups and downs, as well as challenges and dangers along the way.

When we think of the journey the Holy Family had to take, we realise that it was filled with many logistical difficulties and was far from the idyllic scenes we see on our Christmas cards. I believe that Mary and Joseph were stretched to their limit just to reach Bethlehem in time for the census. They faced the added pressure of bringing a child

into the world when there was scarcely a room to be found. In one sense this can seem troubling and we may wish to ask why God didn't provide an easier entry into this world for His only Son. But in another sense, we might find it refreshing that God's preparations were grounded in the realities of life where conditions are rarely favourable. One thing is clear - Mary and Joseph had to trust their onward journey to God's safe hands.

I believe the same can be said for the journey faced by the members of St. Bryce Kirk as they contemplate a future which involves the town centre churches working together. For sure, there will be pain and setback, there will be challenges and disappointments - and there may be frustration that the journey to a ministry of growth is too slow and arduous. Some of these emotions are already being experienced and we know that the challenges we face are significant. Like Mary and Joseph on their arduous journey, blessing is to be found in trusting that God will guide us forward; and I wish to express my gratitude to the team at St. Bryce Kirk who are providing both vision and stability while the process of adjustment is taking place.

From Sunday services, to Kirk Sessions and Business Committee meetings, from café coffeetime to office-interactions, from pearls of wisdom from former General Assembly Moderators to the wise-head and steady pair of hands displayed by your Session Clerk, I have been greatly impressed by the commitment displayed by intelligent, creative, industrious and loving people.

In Bethlehem, where the loveliest carols are set? Where the Wall may not let you out to go to church and the Wall may not let your family in to visit you.

At home with heartbreak and loss and emptiness?

Inside the darkness of a depression that never looks like ending?

In prison?

I've spent Christmas with people in all of these places.

What have I learned?

I have learned where God will be this Christmas.

This Christmas God will be in the worst places.

In Bethlehem.

In the emptiest of homes

In the saddest hearts

And in prison.

It is quite deliberate that the Bible begins the Christmas story at night. Do you remember? there were shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flocks by night. It doesn't mean simply that light and love come into the world when most people are asleep. It means that

light and love come into the world where and when it is very dark, and where and when the light is needed most. The Bible does not say much about parties at Christmas. It says "The light shines in the darkness and the darkness has never been able to put it out".

Congregation after congregation in Scotland will be remembering people in the worst places this Christmas: praying for them, raising money for them, visiting them. Because at their best they know that is where God wants them to be: and because they know that is where God always is, and will be at Christmas.

I used to be in prison each Christmas Day. I used to sing – alongside some of the most lost people in the land –

All out of darkness we have light
Which made the angels sing this night
I believed it then and I believe it now.

Update on Town Centre Churches

Representatives of Presbytery and the Town Centre churches met on November 8th 2022.

Neil Campbell (Mission Director) updated the group and presented the process and timeline for applying for a Transition Ministry which was then discussed. Some frustration was expressed at the process and time it would take- a year at best. Would it be better to focus and progress plan and develop a Team Ministry?

Discussions then took place about what could be achieved if we focussed on progressing the plan. Various suggestions were made, including to consider local mission priorities, team ministry, shape of such a ministry team, and draft basis for union/team charge.

Each Kirk Session was asked to vote: - with the outline,

process and timeline for Transition Ministry now received, whether to:

- a. Proceed with Transition Ministry option, or,
- b. Proceed with the plan and develop team ministry.

St. Bryce Kirk Session voted unanimously to proceed with the plan and develop team ministry.

Guidance on how team ministry could work will be coming from Church of Scotland

The group will meet again on December 12th 2022.
