Tribute to Anne Hughes 21.05.34 - 25.12.20

Anne Dewar Cook was brought up in Kidd Street Kirkcaldy, her father a warehouseman. She was a late addition to the family 8 years junior to brother Bob. It was a good home and Anne was a favoured child. though sadly at the age of 13 her mother died and this impacted her significantly. At Viewforth High school she was good at arithmetic and English, and after school she went to a solicitor's office where she trained in shorthand, typing and secretarial skills. She did things by the book, liked things to be right and trained others to do the same. She later went on to work in the office of Barnet and Morton.

Anne attended the Old Kirk with her family, taught Sunday School at an early age, went on to join the Youth Fellowship where she got to know Bill Hughes. Bill had already embarked upon training for the Merchant Navy, and so Anne was left behind as Bill went off to sea in 1953. But the relationship proved strong and in 1956 they were married in the Old Kirk. They moved from a flat on the High St to Montgomery St in 1964, her home ever since. While Bill was at sea, Anne had long periods on her own, became independent, coping with whatever happened, and making a life for herself with the help of good neighbours, friends in the church and also in Girl Guiding.

In the fifties, Anne had become Brown Owl with the 10th Kirkcaldy Brownies, meeting in the Hunter Hall serving there for many years. But she also served as District Commissioner, Division Treasurer and finally as County Registrations Secretary until she retired and joined the Trefoil Guild in 2006. Anne kept the Girlguiding Fife records meticulously. Numbers were so much bigger then and everything was done on paper. She also ensured that the annual census was all paid on time, again a huge job with the number of units, districts and divisions - almost a full-time job! And everything was done with grace and patience.

In May 1979 Ann, followed Bill in being ordained a church elder and served in that capacity for over 40 years, receiving her Long Service Certificate in 2019. She was also a regular at the Guild over many years and was the Roll Keeper for St Bryce Kirk, until her death. As with so many, Anne and Bill found the tensions around the union of St Brycedale and the Old Kirk hard to bear. Finding real caring and support through difficult times, however, especially during 2007 when following illness, Bill died in July, Anne enjoyed a special place there and will be missed in several ways.

Anne had many contradictions. She needed people and friendships yet she was hard to get close to and had little awareness that her sometimes caustic comments caused hurt. She was serious and formal but she could laugh too. She had a good sense of humour and could laugh at herself. She enjoyed music some pop especially Engelbert, Pet Clark, as well as classical concerts, especially enjoying Nicola

Benedetti. She was a good friend, a heart of gold - was "Auntie Anne" to many people's children! She enjoyed good health all her life, only recently mobility a worry, and in lockdown, anxious, turning in on herself a bit, no doubt worried about what her future would be.

What a way to go! - a shock for us all, but good for her. Her niece, Margaret said "We have many fond memories of Anne, and our last is of her this Christmas Eve, sitting at the patio doors, watching the birds and squirrels feeding at the bird table, glass of wine in hand, with those she loved and who loved her."

Our thoughts and prayers of thanks and condolence go to wonderful neighbours Sheila and William; family members - cousins Ian and Alan Dewar and brother-in-law Malcolm Hughes and all their families, and especially to niece Margaret Campbell, and her husband Dennis, for their committed on-going care.
