


The Mustard

Wednesday Bible Study



We have not yet recovered to our pre-Covid numbers but we have been meeting regularly (10.00 - 11.45) on Wednesday mornings.

After "lock-down" eased, we started again by reading through John's gospel; then looked more closely at the sequence of events of Holy Week by comparing the accounts in all four Gospels.

In complete contrast, we then delved into the Old Testament and traced the journeys of Abraham from the Persian Gulf to Egypt and his nomadic life as he zigzagged up and down and back and forth in what is now Israel, Jordan, Lebanon and Syria.

We continued the travel theme by tracking down all the places from which folk had travelled in order to be in Jerusalem for the first Pentecost after the Resurrection. The distances are amazing. Travel by camel, foot or little sailing ships may have been slower but they seem to have been more reliable than present day trains or planes.

More recently, we have looked at the messages to the *Seven Churches* in the book of Revelation. There are some striking similarities in the problems those early churches were facing to the challenges which beset the Kirk both locally, nationally and in the Western world in general.

When I say we *read* Scripture, I really mean we actually *listen* to Scripture read by David Suchet (Hercule Poirot). When he became a Christian, David decided to use his skills as a trained orator / actor to make a recording of the whole of the Bible - chapter by chapter, all 1189 of them – and we have this on CD. So we listen to beautifully phrased, clearly and correctly pronounced Scripture which can be paused and repeated as we follow it on our own printed N.I.V. editions.

We have a relaxed and fun time – the coffee / tray-bakes / other goodies from the Coffee Bar are allowed - as we learn together more about ourselves and our faith. No deep theological or Bible knowledge is needed – you can sit and just listen - you don't have to contribute though you are likely to get caught up in the discussion and chat. But we have a strict code that "what is said at the Group stays within the Group".

We will be starting again in mid August – watch for notices in the Church notices. Come and join us – we are sure you will enjoy it.



The Church of Scotland Safeguarding Service is a permanent and necessary part of Church life. Harm or abuse of children and adults at risk can happen anywhere, even in church communities.

The Church aims to minimise the risk of harm occurring. If harm or abuse does occur, with appropriate support and training, it will be recognised and reported.

The Church of Scotland Safeguarding Service employs staff with expertise in responding to suspected or reported abuse, safe recruitment, child and adult protection and providing tailored safeguarding training programmes.

However, we all have a part to play in ensuring a Safe Church for all. If harm or abuse is suspected or witnessed, or reported to you, you must immediately report it to the Safeguarding Coordinator.

Our new Safeguarding Coordinator is Jennifer Wilson and we thank her for taking on this important role.

MINING FOR GOD

I recently had the privilege of talking to a former Chief Inspector of Prisons, (whom some of us may know) about his work. My interest in his work came from my previous role as Headteacher, where some children had parents in prison, it was heart breaking for the family on so many levels. In his prison report were points I hadn't given much thought to, other points were completely new to me, and yet others gave me hope.



For so many, if a crime has been committed, the attitude is "lock them up", and for some serious crimes - "and throw away the key" is added. If I'm being honest, I too have said that, at times when I've watched or read about a heinous crime.

In the Chief Inspector's report, he quoted an American Judge, Dennis Challeen who said:

"We want them to have self-worth So, we destroy their self-worth We want them to be responsible So, we take away all responsibility We want them to be positive and constructive So, we degrade them and make them useless We want them to be trustworthy So, we put them where there is no trust We want them to be non-violent So, we put them where violence is all around them We want them to be kind and loving people So, we subject them to hatred and cruelty We want them to quit being the tough guy So, we put them where the tough guy is respected We want them to guit hanging around losers So, we put all the losers under one roof"

What a truth in the judge's words.

I came across a quote recently that said "God is within everyone even if due to someone's attitude or behaviour, it seems otherwise. Everyone has at least one positive trait if we can open our hearts and minds".

Often the people who are hardest to love - are those who need loved the most. So, we need to do some "Mining for God" and look for that "Divine Diamond" that's within everyone. This Divinity is there, but is layered up with so much hurt, pain, anxiety, low self-esteem, disappointment, fear....., it is deeply hidden.

In my job, I had the opportunity of working with families who lived lives completely out with my experience. It was humbling to listen to their stories. Some lived with domestic violence and poverty, others lived with drug and alcohol addiction, which led to crime, at times, serious crime.

It wasn't rocket science to realise how these horrendous experiences impacted on families, and how they lived their lives in fear and uncertainty. What the children experienced are now known as ACEs - Adverse Childhood Experiences. Evidence has shown that the more ACEs a child lives with or experiences, the higher the probability of them ending up on a very challenging life path too, often criminal and leading them to prison. The importance of early intervention, support and education is key in working towards changing this perpetuating cycle. I often listened to children and families share their stories of despair and felt anger towards the parent/carer causing the distress.

At these times, I couldn't see the "Divine Diamond" in the mum or dad. I was unable to open my heart and mind and look for the positive traits they had.



We all have a task to look at why some people turn to crime and what can be done to help prevent it.

There needs to be greater partnership working between organisations that can work with prisons, to support education and skills development. There also has to be emotional rehabilitation too, such as anger management, building self-esteem and greater self- belief. The people in prisons need help to find their gifts and skills, which are unique to them. People who break the law, do need to spend time in prison, as crimes can't be ignored, however, it's what happens in prisons that's crucial.

Irene Brown quotes in Rising Strong that prisoners who have committed heinous crimes, such as terrorists, serial killers, serial rapists and assassins still need assessed to see if they can be helped, and if they can't, they need to remain in prison. This is the most humane approach and safer for communities. Compassion needs to be partnered with accountability,

The Chief Inspector coined a wonderful phrase,: -

"A better Scotland would have better prisons, and better prisons would give us a better Scotland",

I believe this could be said of any country, what about you?
