To Members and Office-bearers of St Bryce Kirk

Dear Friends

I am writing to you as your new Interim Moderator, following in the capable footprints of Robin McAlpine and I look forward to working with you recognizing that the St Bryce congregation has many gifted and talented individuals maintaining continuity and serving the needs of the parish. I hope that this latest transition will feel relatively seamless since Sunday worship will continue to be led by The Very Reverend Dr Andrew McLellan and the arrangements currently in



place for pastoral matters will remain unchanged. If you need me for anything just get in touch.

Concerning the current vacancy, St Bryce Kirk is in a holding position for now. The reason for this is that the General Assembly agreed, as part of the Presbytery Mission Planning process, that all vacancies would be sisted (held in abeyance), save those where Presbyteries and the Faith Nurture Forum had approved permission to call as an exception. Once the Planning Process for the Presbytery of Fife has been agreed by the Faith Nurture Forum, congregations in vacancy will be able to resume activities within the terms of the agreed plan. In the meantime, cluster conversations continue and outcomes will be shared once agreement has been reached.

While discussions are continuing, my prayer is that we never grow weary in service. We live in a world which desperately needs to hear the message of Christ, reaching out to all the dark places in our world. In Lent and Easter which are seasons of spiritual reflection we are reminded that our world needs justice, forgiveness, healing and reconciliation. It was Charles Spurgeon who once said, "I have a great need for Christ: I have a great Christ for my need." The situation in Ukraine has brought those words into sharp focus. Christians proclaim Christ crucified and risen, the One who remains constant through all the changing seasons of life. With Christ as our hope and inspiration we have nothing to fear. If you are in any doubt, remember Jesus own words to His disciples contained in John's Gospel chapter 16, verse 33, "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world."



Followed, of course, by a Summer Afternoon Tea. How good is that!



Presbytery of Fife Mission Plan for St Bryce Kirk

First Draft

(for prayerful consideration.)

This draft of the Fife Presbytery Mission Plan, produced by the Board of Mission: Strategy & Planning Task Group, is intended for consultation and discussion, with Kirk Sessions, **C**lusters / **A**rea / **G**roups (CAG's) and Presbytery.

Working to the timeline agreed by the February 2022 meeting of Presbytery, the plan has been produced following a period of extensive consultation across Presbytery and Kirk Sessions and facilitated Cluster Group conversations throughout our Presbytery.

The May 2021 General Assembly and the Presbytery Mission Plan Act allow an allocation of 44.5 FTE (Full Time Equivalent) Ministries to Fife Presbytery. To deliver this, Presbytery has to consider the necessary structural changes and adjustments, as well as to categorise all our Church Buildings and Church Halls (not Manses at present).

All ministries including: Full Time Ministers of Word and Sacrament; Ministry Development Staff; Ordained Local Ministers; Deacons and Readers have been considered in determining the allocation of ministries. Extensive use has been made of information gathered from consultation with Kirk Sessions and records taken from CAG's meetings and dialogue.

The Mission Strategy (Feb. 2022) was applied to the existing (Legacy) Plans which had been developed by the Presbyteries of Dunfermline, Kirkcaldy and St Andrews.

Using guidance from the General Trustees (C of S) to deliver, 'well-equipped spaces, in the right places,' the Mission Strategy and Planning Task Group have worked hard with the Board of Management and Presbytery Property Convenors to find a goodand fair solution.

The General Trustees *Asset Management Building Audit* (AMBA) has been a valuable asset in discerning our building categorisation. (Note 1 below)

Presbytery will categorise each ecclesiastical building as either: - (A) to be retained beyond the five years or

(B) to be sold, let or otherwise disposed of by a specified date within five years from the date at which the building is first categorised as (B).

There have been several meetings of our local Cluster Group churches with the Minister or Interim Moderator, Session Clerk and an Elder from each Congregation and Facilitators. On 8th March, the Group announced:-

"A proposal was agreed by all Kirk Sessions to move to being One church in Kirkcaldy Town Centre along with Auchtertool as a Local Mission Church. This would mean moving to a multiple union as soon as possible after January 2023. There would be one Kirk Session although there may be a need to re-imagine how the Kirk Session is organised."

The Presbytery of Fife Mission Plan for the Parishes of Abbotshall, Bennochy, Linktown and St Bryce is :-

To develop and form, before the 2023 PMP Review :-A Team Ministry by union of the 4 town centre churches

Comprising :-

2.5 FTE Ministries to include at least 1Minister of Word and Sacrament as part of a Team Ministry along with Locally Ordained Minister / Reader. Funded Posts could include: Administrator/Church Officer, Community/ Childrens' / Youth Worker (s), Mission Development Worker.

As a next step the full plan will be published to Presbytery on Monday 4th April, when a period of reflection and consultation will begin until Friday 6th May.

We have been encouraged to communicate and share the details with our Kirk Session and congregation.

It is requested that **we do not publicise** the details at this stage.

Note1

AMBA - Asset Management Buildings Audit.

Over the last six months a small team from Fife Presbytery's Board of Management have been carrying out a Buildings Audit in conjunction with the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland. The aim of this audit was to have a database of all the assets in the Presbytery, including Churches, Halls and other buildings. The form included a whole variety of information from the condition of windows and doors, to the location of the buildings and how they were used. We now have a full audit of all the buildings, and this will be very helpful to the General Trustees who own the vast majority of the buildings, and also to the Presbytery of Fife Buildings Officer, David Gillan.

To muffle his message and his sureness of the days to come?


Too late now, too late to think of what might have been. The bright promise turned to dust and bitter ash.

No more their joy and good news for tie world.




The sky turns black, a peal of thunder Booms across the darkening town. Forked lightning rips through the suffocating gloom And tears the curtain of the Temple clean in two.

Simple Easter Cross Craft


You will need:

Cardboard (why not recycle a piece of cardboard?)
String/wool/yarn Scissors
Heart shape to decorate (optional)



Cut a cross out of the cardboard. (The bigger, the better!)

Cut some slits all around the cross, placing them roughly 1 cm



Now wrap the string around the cross in any way, making sure it goes into the slits: go all around the cross, securing any loose ends by pushing them under the string at the back.

You could attach a piece of string to hang it up and glue a heart to the middle of the cross

The **Appalachian Trail** stretches over two thousand miles through the hills and woods of the eastern United States. It was laid out for hikers to enjoy little bits: a day's hiking, or a week's, In 1948 an exsoldier called Earl Schaffer walked the whole distance from start to finish. It took him a hundred and twenty nine days. While he was doing it, the Journal of the Appalachian Trail Association published an article by its editor proving that it was impossible for one person to walk the whole way.

"That showed them! That put the merchants of doom in their place." Let the Easter story do that for you. Let the Easter story speak to you of the impossible being made possible. God raised Jesus from death to life. Jesus, who was dead and buried is risen and alive. At the very least, let that story give you hope. At the most, let that story give you the faith that nothing in all creation will be able to separate you and those whom you love from the love of God.

The poet Alice Meynell is out of fashion these days: but you might like her poem. Read it slowly: better still, read it out loud.


Vine Trust Project - Kazunzu Village of Hope

Recently, our **Young Church** expressed interest in setting up a hedgehog-friendly habitat in our church grounds. We received the information below from volunteer Moira Grant at the British Hedgehog Preservation Society. She asked us to consider: :-

"How long is it since you last saw a hedgehog?"

We did not know that hedgehogs are now officially classed as vulnerable to extinction in the UK!

Here are some ways you can help this prickly little creature of God:

- 1. Create a wild corner in your garden
- 2. Make your pond safe with a ramp
- 3. Clear away netting and litter to prevent entanglements
- 4. Put out food and water (never milk)
- 5. Stop using chemicals when gardening
- 6. Check before strimming or lighting fires
- 7. Become a Hedgehog Champion by registering on the website, which has resources to make your garden, neighbourhood and Parish hedgehog-friendly zones. https://www.hedgehogstreet.org/website,
- 8. Link your garden with Hedgehog Highways create a small gap in your fence the size of a CD case to let them pass through and ask your neighbours to do the same!

(Hedgehogs travel between1 - 2 km a night searching for food!)
We will let you know if we spot any signs of hedgehogs in our church gardens!
